

Many families go to spend time with family vacationing together in a large air B&B that sits on the edge of the dunes overlooking the North Atlantic in Emerald Isle. Some drive to exciting fast paced touristy places such as Myrtle Beach in South Carolina. I like the slow pace of a family oriented sparsely crowded spit of sand found in an area of the North Carolina Southern Outer Banks called the "Crystal Coast". To some people driving that almost 5 hours from the Piedmont Triad part of North Carolina may seem to be a chore. Some find it easier than others and some just allocate a nice day of leisurely travel occasionally stopping at a couple of rest areas and one for fuel replenishment.

When you arrive and unpack your belongings, you may be lingering into the evening hours and feeling a bit tired from the long day of driving and shopping for the needed sundries for the week. So, an early hour to bed to prepare for the week ahead with grandchildren and adult children who will arrive later in the week. The next day starts with the morning sun rise over the ocean and a suttle beam of light peaks into the bedroom awakening you and luring you to look outside at the waves as they gently lap the sandy shore.

You arise and walk down the small boardwalk to the sand and a familiar aroma greets you as a salty briny scent that is pleasing to the senses. You become mesmerized with the sounds of the waves gently lapping the sand of the beach in an aged old dance of ebb and flow. When you leave, your step will be a little lighter, your burdens a little less burdensome, the song in your heart a little bit easier to hear.

When I think of my very special place I want to go to month after month year after year, this is it. Will this desire every go away? Maybe someday. But for now, it is a desire of why I call this place on the earth almost "Heaven".
